


There were 47 responses from people who gave post codes that sit within the locality of Kilmacolm and Quarriers.


The overall highest scoring areas (based on average scores) were natural space (6.6), feeling safe (5.8) and streets and spaces (5.6). The lowest scoring areas are traffic and parking (3.4) and public transport (3.5).


Kilmacolm average scores





Demographics

There were 41 female and 6 male survey respondents.










Where did you hear about the survey?




The average scores and recurring themes from comments for each aspect of the Place Standard are as follows:

1. Moving Around

Q: Can I easily walk and cycle around using good quality routes?

Average rating = 5.1

Moving Around



Key / recurring themes from comments:

- A number of respondents commented that they felt the area had good quality walking routes and cycle paths
- A small number of respondents felt that cycle routes were poor
- Poor pavements / footpaths


2. Public Transport

Q: Does public transport meet my needs?

- A car is required to live in the area


3. Traffic and Parking

- Parking on pavements / misuse of parking arrangements is an issue


4. Streets and Spaces

Streets and Spaces





The graph below shows the range of scores from those that responded to this question.




A small number of respondents provided comments in relation to this topic. Key / recurring themes from comments:

Key themes from comments:


- Lack of facilities for teenagers

Key themes from comments:


- Many of respondents commented on the Kilmacolm Community Centre although there were issues noted with it being closed on a Sunday; under utlised; price rises too high

- Lack of employment opoprtunites, cost of travelling to employment can be an issue and also poor public transport to Glasgow


9. Housing & Community

Housing & Community




Key/ recurring themes from comments:

The graph below shows the range of scores from those that responded to this question.





Key /recurring themes from comments:

Q: Does this place have a positive identity and do I feel I belong? Average rating = 5.4






There were a small number of responses to this question. Key / recurring themes from comments:

The graph below shows the range of scores from those that responded to this question.




Key/ recurring themes from comments:

Key / recurring themes from comments:


- Littering is an issue, several respondents mentioned this being a particular problem at Balrossie
