ABOUT THE FESTIVAL

Welcome to our inaugural Inverclyde Film Festival which we hope going forward will become an annual event for many years to come. This first edition is supported by Regional Screen Scotland's Local Film Challenge Fund to develop the concept of, build interest for and plan the format of, a new local Inverclyde film festival based at the Waterfront Cinema.

The festival was programmed by John Cunningham the General Manager of West Coast Cinemas with support from Kat Boyle – Inverclyde Arts Coordinator based at CVS Inverclyde. The festival theme is inspired by Event Scotland's Year of Coast and Waters 2020, local heritage and films which were created in Inverclyde such as 'Sweet Sixteen'. We have delved deep into the Scottish Screen Archives for some local gems which we hope will bring back some fond memories of years gone by. The programme also includes two classics (Meet Me in St Louis and The Magnificent Ambersons) which will give you a rare chance to see them on the big screen, as they were meant to be seen.

Associated activity also includes: 'Going to the Pictures - A history of cinema in Inverclyde', Film/TV Creative Industries Panel Discussion with some of the most cutting edge names working in Scotland, 'Ideas into action: the elements of screen writing' workshop, the award-winning film 'The Why?s Man' about George Wyllie and also a sneak peak of TVI Vision's 60 minute documentary for BBC Scotland about the impact of IBM on Scotland - in this exclusive session, you will see clips of the forthcoming BBC film followed by a discussion with the production team.

We hope you all enjoy what we have to offer this year and that there is something for everyone. We also look forward to hearing your feedback and thoughts looking towards our next edition in 2021.

An educational film tracing the history of shipping and the shipbuilding industries on the Clyde estuary.

Certificates

Each film in the programme has a certificate from U (Universal) to 18 (over 18s only). By law we must abide by this certification. All screenings take place at Waterfront Cinema. Workshops and additional events will take place in Greenock Central Library, Watt Institute and Beacon Arts Centre.
