2.	COVID-19 Coronavirus - Waste collection staff coming into close contact with members of public during collection round:  Possibility of community contracted infection or passing it on.	<ul> <li>Practice social distancing while at work keeping between 1 and 2 meters between staff and public as operationally possible.*</li> <li>While at breaks, wash hands thoroughly before eating/drinking.</li> <li>Hands must be washed/sanitised before and after work at each premises, hand washing should be last thing to do before leaving.</li> <li>Covid-19 is active in the community, therefore vulnerable employees to be re-deployed to less affected areas or sent home. i.e. those who are elderly, have underlying health conditions or are vulnerable to infection as per NHS guidelines (see para 5&amp;6 of this document).</li> </ul>		
3.	COVID-19 Coronavirus - Waste collection staff coming into contact with contaminated surfaces within depot:	<ul> <li>Soap and water available in toilets</li> <li>Depot cleaned on a regular basis, step up of cleaning regimes to be more regular and cleaners advised to increase cleaning of door handles, light switches and other areas which are regularly used.</li> <li>Disinfectant wipes available for microwaves, PC workstations and telephones so that they can be cleaned on a regular basis.</li> </ul>

4.	COVID-19 Coronavirus spread through exposure or close contact with waste collection crew.	<ul> <li>Practice spatial distancing while at work keeping between 1 and 2 meters between staff as operationally possible.</li> <li>While at breaks, wash hands thoroughly before eating/drinking.</li> <li>Hands must be washed/sanitised before and after work at each premises, hand washing should be last thing to do before leaving.</li> <li>If any crew member on duty becomes unwell with a new, continuous cough or a high temperature they should be sent home and advised to follow the government self isolation guidance.</li> <li>If an employee is awaiting collection, they should be moved, if possible, to a room where they can be isolated behind a closed door. Ideally, a window should be opened for ventilation. If it is not possible to isolate them, move them to an area which is at least 2 metres away from other people.</li> <li>Leave the cab/vehicle where the suspected person with COVID-19 is and leave the door open to air/ventilate it. If necessary, only reenter it after the person has left, Wipe down surfaces before going into vehicle and travel back with the window fully open.</li> <li>RCV crew labourers can meet RCV on route directly from home using their own transport</li> </ul>		



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	Safety Hazard	<ul> <li>where appropriate and leave for home after shift – RCV supervisors to coordinate.</li> <li>Staff support will be provided to drive RCV crew labourers to and from route site using minibuses.</li> <li>Minibuses will be used with a driver and one member of staff. Minibus could be used to transfer more than one person so long as social distancing can be maintained.</li> <li>Support can entail drop-off and pick-up of RCV crew labourers or following RCVs on route.</li> <li>Single crew member where appropriate can take one vehicle and meet the refuse vehicle on site.</li> <li>Support will be able to go home until required for pick-up.</li> <li>Vehicles with a driver only to assist refuse collection where practicable.</li> <li>Agreed task and finish until further notice with whole task being completed before everyone is sent home.</li> </ul>	Requirements	Concerns
5.	COVID-19 Coronavirus spread through exposure to vulnerable employee with the following underlying health conditions. This group includes those who are:  • aged 70 or older (regardless of medical conditions)	Employees within this group are at increased risk and as such the NHS guidance outlined on ICON must be followed. Employees who are over 70, have underlying health conditions or are pregnant must make immediate contact with their line manager.

	<ul> <li>under 70 with an underlying health condition listed below (ie anyone instructed to get a flu jab as an adult each year on medical grounds):</li> <li>chronic (long-term) respiratory diseases, such as asthma, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), emphysema or bronchitis</li> <li>chronic heart disease, such as heart failure</li> <li>chronic kidney disease</li> <li>chronic liver disease, such as hepatitis</li> <li>chronic neurological conditions, such as Parkinson's disease, motor neurone disease, multiple sclerosis (MS), a learning disability or cerebral palsy</li> <li>diabetes</li> <li>problems with your spleen – for example, sickle cell disease or if you have had your spleen removed</li> <li>a weakened immune system as the result of conditions such as HIV and AIDS, or medicines such as steroid tablets or chemotherapy</li> </ul>		Requirements	Concerns

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	<ul> <li>people who have received an organ transplant and remain on ongoing immunosuppression medication</li> <li>people with cancer who are undergoing active chemotherapy or radiotherapy</li> <li>people with cancers of the blood or bone marrow such as leukaemia who are at any stage of treatment</li> <li>people with severe chest conditions such as cystic fibrosis or severe asthma (requiring hospital admissions or courses of steroid tablets)</li> <li>people with severe diseases of body systems, such as severe kidney disease (dialysis)</li> </ul>	must be followed.
