Citizen's Panel is also engaged in discussion regarding the actions outlined in the Local Child Poverty Action Plan, Poverty and Inequalities were the focus of discussion at the Community Listening Events that were facilitated in February 2021, with people across the 6 localities, many of who experience poverty themselves. The results of the Community Listening Events were themed and reported to the Anti Poverty Strategy Group. A committee report was aken to Policy and Resources with recommendations on the actions that would mitigate poverty based on the evidence from the listening events. These recommendations were approved and £1 million was allocated to Anti Poverty Initiatives.
