	Age: School buildings and pitches are utilised by organisations who provide sport and youth activities for school aged children. A reduction in the availability of school lets could lead to reduced opportunities for young people to take part in sport and youth activities out with school hours. In addition, the organisations who let school buildings may have to pass on the charges they will now incur to the young people. This could lead to children from low income families no longer being able to take part in activities which utilise school facilities
	<u>Disability:</u> Disability Groups use school and town hall lets and therefore the budget proposal could impact on their ability to meet in locations of their choosing.



	Sex: Girls are more likely than boys to report barriers to doing physical activity (67% girls; 54% boys) (Inverclyde Council Schools Health and Wellbeing Survey 2019) Therefore reduced opportunities to take part in sport activities caused by reducing the availability of school lets could have a negative impact on girls.

Briefly describe how the budget saving proposal will impact on reducing inequalities of outcome.

The introduction of charges for uniformed organisations and the removal of fee waivers for charitable organisations will have a negative impact on low-income families and on reducing equalities of outcome. These organisations may have to pass on the additional charges they will now incur to their members, making it more difficult for low income families to be able to afford to take part in the sport and youth activities that take place through school and town hall lets. Taking part in physical activity, including sport is important in reducing health inequalities. This budget saving option could make it more difficult for people to take part in sporting activities.

<u>Priority 2</u>: A wide range of community meetings take place within schools and town halls. A reduction in school lets and the introduction of charges will impact on their



ability to hold these meetings and will be detrimental to building strong, empowered communities.

<u>Priorities 4 and 5</u>: The introduction of charges could place an even greater strain on household incomes and prevent children and low income families from being able to participate in activities.

<u>Priority 6</u>: It is important that we encourage Inverclyde residents to lead healthier lifestyles by taking part in physical activity, including sport, in order to reduce health inequalities. The budget saving proposal could have an adverse impact on achieving this priority.

<u>Priority 8</u>: Communities, community groups and clubs have told us that they would like greater access to existing facilities such as schools, particularly in their local area. Therefore, this budget proposal will have an impact on the availability of facilities which are responsive to community needs.

Evidence	Details
Consultation/Engagement	 Engagement was held with communities in September 2022 to inform the development of a new Local Outcome Improvement Plan and Council Plan. Communities told us that they want: more organised and affordable physical activity for communities; more affordable activities in order to encourage participation; more community exercise events; greater provision and opportunities for people to lead healthier lifestyles; and better use made of existing facilities such as schools.



	Budget Consultation 2022: 38% of respondents supported this Budget Saving Proposal.
Data	There is a range of evidence that shows levels of physical activity are lower amongst the population of Inverclyde compared to other local authority areas. For example:
	The NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde 2017/18 Health and Wellbeing Survey shows those in Inverclyde were less likely to meet the target of 150 minutes or more of physical activity per week compared to the NHSGG&C total (48% Inverclyde; 58% NHSGGC). (NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde 2017/18 Health and Wellbeing Survey)
	 Between 2013 and 2019, 48% of the Inverclyde population reported doing at least one sport, excluding walking. This increases to 78% if walking is included. The national average is 53%, excluding walking and 79% including walking. (Scottish Household Survey)
	 10% of young people aged 13-15 met the target of taking 60 minutes or more of moderate physical activity on seven days per week. Scottish figure is 18%. (Inverclyde Council Schools Health and Wellbeing Survey 2019)
	 Girls were more likely than boys to report barriers to doing physical activity (67% girls; 54% boys) (Inverclyde Council Schools Health and Wellbeing Survey 2019)
