You may be able to get Universal Credit if:

- You are out of work
- You are in work and have low earnings.



Most new benefit claims will be for Universal Credit.

To get Universal Credit, you have to live in England, Northern Ireland, Scotland or Wales.

- Child Tax Credit
- Working Tax Credit
- Housing Benefit



- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance.

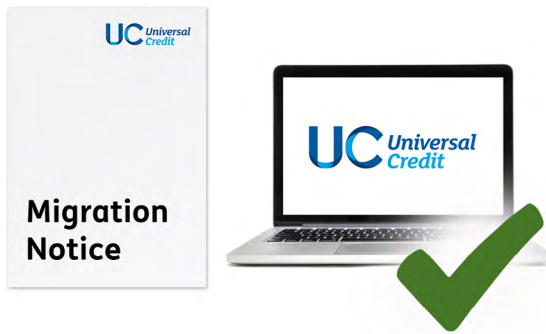


When it is time to move to Universal Credit, the Department for Work and Pensions will write to you.



Look out for a letter called a Universal Credit Migration Notice.

This will tell you what you need to do and when to apply for Universal Credit.



Waiting for your letter will mean you will continue to get financial support when you apply for Universal Credit.



This means you will be able to get at least the same level of support as you do on your current benefits.



If your circumstances change before we contact you, let us know as soon as possible.
