1.0 PURPOSE

Updates on the work of the other three thematic groups were brought to brought to the December 2024 Alliance meeting.

4.0 BACKGROUND

- 4.1 Inverclyde's Partnership Plan 2023-33 was formally agreed by the Alliance Board on the 13 March 2023, with a focus on the themes of Empowered People, Working People, Healthy People and Places, A Supportive Place, and a Thriving Place. These themes are all associated with further high-level outcomes.
- 4.2 The Alliance Board Terms of Reference and proposed delivery structure grouping under the new Partnership Plan were agreed by the Alliance Board on 18 March 2024. Updates on the work of each group and progress against the outcomes are brought to the Alliance Board on a six-monthly basis. At the December 2024 meeting information was provided in relation to Thriving Communities, Safe and Supported Communities, and Children's Services. This report provides a progress update for the past six months for the Tackling Inequalities and Improving People's Lives; Economic Board and Place Partnership thematic groups.

The Tackling Inequalities and Improving People's Lives Group delivers on outcomes for the Trauma Informed Steering Group, Inverclyde Cares, the Financial Inclusion Partnership and the Child Poverty Action Group.

The group last met in February 2025 where an update of progress against the various associated plans was discussed and agreed. The full progress report is included at Appendix 1.

The Economic Board has oversight of the Local Employability Partnership, the Regeneration Forums and Town Centre Action Plans and the Senior Phase Action Plan. The Board last met in January 2025. Progress against actions is presented within Appendix 2.

	The National Lottery Heritage Fund (NLHF) supported Connecting Inverclyde Heritage Project has now launched, with a Heritage Coordinator in post to lead the project over a three-year period. Activity is already underway to engage heritage groups, individuals and communities with the wider aims of this project. Ultimately, the Heritage Coordinator will deliver a refreshed Action Plan to progress the Inverclyde Heritage Strategy, leveraging heritage resources to raise the profile of Inverclyde.
	Inverclyde Libraries have been working with NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde to pilot activity focused on Realistic Medicine – an approach to patient care that ensures individuals are involved in decision- making around their care and can make choices about their treatment that they feel best supports them. Activity undertaken to date has been recognised by the Chief Medical Officer and further extends the library service's commitment to supporting health and wellbeing in Inverclyde through their participation in the Collective Force for Health and Wellbeing initiative.






