It is the ambition of the Health and Social Care Partnership to strengthen our community supports and reduce the balance of care in residential settings.

Research	Overall bed numbers are managed well within the resource allocation group currently and this will continue. Delayed discharges will be managed through better use of care at home (regraded social care workers and new care at home framework from April 2024). The length of stay in care homes is reducing which demonstrates a positive trend in increasing the number of people who are able to remain in their own homes. However, demographic pressures of an increasingly frail, older population mean that individuals with greater health and care needs are being supported in the community, including care homes.

Equalities monitoring data	There is still an overall budget for approximately 550 long term care beds and this reduction is only 1% overall. Over 2024/25 average placement numbers sit just under 546.
