#### 1.0 PURPOSE

1.1 The purpose of this report is to present to the Alliance Board the new SOA 7 Environment Outcome Delivery Plan.

#### 2.0 SUMMARY

- 2.1 The Environment Outcome Delivery Group (ODG) reviewed its Outcome Delivery Plan over the summer months in order to refocus effort on partnership actions that deliver community planning priorities and that add value to the work which is already being delivered. On this basis, several of the existing actions were dropped from the plan and new actions identified.
- 2.2 The new Outcome Delivery Plan has been further informed by presentations by the Central Green Network Trust on project delivery and by Health Scotland on the Fundamental Causes of Inequalities.
- 2.3 The new Outcome Delivery Plan is attached for the approval of the Alliance Board in Appendix 1. At this stage, all the actions are scored green at this initial stage but we can expect scoring to be more varied in future as a consequence of focusing on delivering new partnership actions
- 2.4 The chair of the Environment ODG, Ross Johnston, is moving to a new role within Scottish Natural Heritage. The role of chair will pass to Kerry Wallace, Operations Manager, Scottish Natural Heritage the New Year.

#### 3.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

- 3.1 It is recommended that the Alliance Board:
  - a. Approve the new SOA7 Environment Outcome Delivery Plan.
  - b. Note that a quarterly progress report for this Plan will be submitted to future meetings of the Alliance Board.

### 4.0 BACKGROUND

- 4.1 In April 2015, Ross Johnston was appointed as the new Lead Officer for the Environment Outcome Delivery Group.
- 4.2 One of the first tasks undertaken was to carry out a review of the Outcome Delivery Plan in order to reflect the discussions that have taken place regarding the need to better evidence inequality, partnership working and added value in the Plans.
- 4.3 The new Outcome Delivery Plan is attached for the consideration and approval of the Alliance Board in Appendix 1. The improvement actions contained within the Plan will help in the delivery of the SOA 7 strategic outcome:

All children, citizens and communities in Inverclyde play an active role in nurturing the environment to make the area a sustainable and desirable place to live and visit.

#### 5.0 IMPLICATIONS

- 5.1 <u>Finance:</u> The actions within the outcome delivery plan will be financed through existing partner budgets however sources of external funding will be sought wherever possible to supplement this and to fund additional pieces of work that help in the delivery of this strategic outcome.

- 5.6 <u>Inequalities:</u> Tackling inequalities has been a key consideration when considering priorities for the new plans. The Plan contains actions with a specific inequalities focus.
