Age – Library services are used more by children and young people, and by older people. Therefore closures & reductions in service will affect these groups disproportionately. A reduction in the Books on Wheels service (library services for housebound people) will impact on very elderly people who cannot travel to a library.

<u>Disability</u> – People with reduced mobility may find it more difficult to access library services if there are library closures & reductions. Libraries provide local access to adaptive technology (software and hardware) enabling disabled people to access computing and the internet. A reduction in the Books on Wheels service (library services for housebound people) will impact on disabled people who cannot travel to a library.

<u>Pregnancy and maternity</u> – Libraries are well used by new mums on maternity leave. A reduction in Bookbug provision may impact on this group.



<u>Sex</u> – Library services are both used, and staffed, more by women than men. Therefore closure, service reduction and subsequent redundancies will affect women disproportionately.

There are 12 libraries staff potentially affected by this proposal, of which 11 are female and 1 is male. The proposal will therefore affect predominantly female workers. The age profile of the female employees is:

Age 20-29 - 1

Age 30-39 - 1

Age 40-49 - 2

Age 50-59 - 3

Age 60+ - 4.

This profile is showing 64% of employees are aged over 50.

<u>People on low incomes</u> – This group has greater need for library services and is therefore disproportionately affected by service reduction and withdrawal.

<u>Universal Credit claimants</u> – Welfare payments now have to be claimed using an online system. People in this group are less likely than average to have access to the internet at home. Lack of free internet access in libraries will disproportionately affect this group.

Briefly describe how the budget saving proposal will impact on reducing inequalities of outcome.

Research shows that libraries can not only tackle the key indicators of social exclusion (health, crime, unemployment and education) but also play a wider role in tackling disadvantage, inequality and discrimination. Libraries provide free access to books and reading including special collections promoting inclusion such as large print, audio, dyslexia friendly etc; free access to PCs, the internet, hardware and software; IT classes, job clubs and other forms of support for Universal Credit claimants; a partnership with Macmillan Cancer Support improving access to information for local people living with cancer; events and activities for both adults and young people, including some specifically aimed at reducing inequalities for excluded groups including people with autism, and people at risk of social isolation.

This budget saving proposal entails reduced opening hours, a library closure, and reduced professional support and therefore its implementation is likely to impact on the ability of the library service to tackle the key indicators of social exclusion.

Consultation/Engagement	In the 2018 Budget consultation, 48% of respondents supported the proposal to reduce opening hours at Greenock Central Library and 38% of respondents agreed with the proposal to close South West Library. In the 2017 Budget consultation, 46% of respondents supported the proposal to reduce library services. In the 2016 Citizen's Panel Spring 2016 survey, 83% of respondents who had used a public library in the previous 12 months were either very satisfied or satisfied with Inverclyde's libraries.



	Respondents were most satisfied with opening hours (85%), library locations (80%) and children and young people's provision (67%). Respondents were least satisfied with range of books and materials (19%).
