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Introduction

I am pleased to present this report to the Police Fire and Rescue Committee for its information and consideration.

Please note that all data included in this report are management information and not official statistics.

All data are sourced from Police Scotland internal systems and are correct as of date of publication.

Unless stated otherwise numerical comparisons are against the preceding five year average.

PRIORITY AREA	EXECUTIVE SUMMARY
Drug supply and misuse	Drug dealing and misuse continues to be a priority area for our attention in Inverclyde as communities tell us they are concerned about the harm caused. Although our detections for drug supply are lower than last year we have been proactive in addressing this issue. We continue to gather intelligence for further enforcement action in Inverclyde, however we manage this from a Divisional perspective as criminals do not recognise Local Authority boundaries. There have been 20 drugs supply detections in Inverclyde year-to-date, compared to a five year average of 43.
Violence & ASB	The level of overall violent crime is down by 7.3% on the previous five year average. Meanwhile, there have been 28 fewer common assaults compared to the previous five year average of 314. 94 common assaults were perpetrated against emergency workers, an increase on the previous five year average of 10.3% ASB is down by 24% on the previous year to a total of 2,117 incidents.
Dishonesty	 Housebreaking crimes continue to fall, with fewer crimes relating to all property types. However, recorded fraud continues to increase locally, mirroring the national trend—with the volume of fraud crimes rising 49.8% compared to five year average figures. Cyber-criminals are continuously looking for new ways to target potential victims. There has been a proliferation in the use of tactics such as scam phone calls, text messages and emails, as well as fake websites and social media posts, by which criminals seek to deceive people into handing over personal details and passwords.
Road Safety	The number of casualties on Inverclyde roads has fallen from 22 to 19. There have been one fatality in the current year. Proactive policing of In- verclyde's roads has led to an increase in reported drink and drug driving offences.

CONTEXT

The volume of recorded crime and offences has fallen by 3.2% on the previous year and by 13.2% on the preceding five year average, with a longer term decrease in non-sexual crimes of violence, crimes of dishonesty, vandalism and fireraising, miscellaneous offences and offences relating to motor vehicles driving the fall in overall volume. Meanwhile, recorded police incidents have fallen by 8.9% on the previous year, and by 12.2% on the five year average.

ONLINE & CYBERCRIME - DATA OVERVIEW

CONTEXT

In the period April – October 2021, 81 crimes have been designated as 'cyber-crimes' by Police Scotland's Cyber-Crime Intelligence Analysts. Over 57% of these were classed as financial/economic crimes, predominantly cyberenabled fraud. Other cyber-crimes impacting on Inverclyde's communities include computer hacking, cyber-enabled sexual offences, and threatening and abusive communications.

Inverclyde Police have been running social media campaigns leading up to the festive period to give advice on personal safety, money handling and highlighting the risk of using unauthorised money lenders. This localised information complemented a national campaign regarding on-line & telephone based frauds to help raise awareness and help people to identify scammers who target the most vulnerable in our communities.

ACQUISITIVE CRIME — DATA OVERVIEW



CONTEXT

251 shoplifting crimes have been recorded – an increase of 5.3% compared to the five year average. The detection rate has fallen by 0.8 percentage points on the five year average to 79.3% in the current year.



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Housebreaking crimes (including attempts) fell from a five year average of 109 to 73 crimes. There were fewer HBs to all categories of premises. The detection rate has increased by 3.9 percentage points on the five year average to 21.9% in the current year.



Motor vehicle crimes have fallen by 40.3% on the five year average to a total of 57 crimes. Theft of a motor vehicle continues to account for the highest proportion of motor vehicle crime (n=20). The MV crime detection rate is 22.8%, a decrease 8.2 percentage points on the previous five year average.

Two bogus caller crimes have been recorded in the current year. One involved a government boiler replacement scheme doorstep fraud, and the second related to failure to undertake gardening work after payment.

COUNTER TERRORISM & DOMESTIC EXTREMISM

CONTEXT

In November 2021 the Home Secretary announced an increase in the UK's Terrorist Threat Level from 'Substantial' to 'Severe'. This means it is deemed an attack is highly likely. At this time there is nothing to suggest that there is any specific threat to Scotland. However, the threat from Islamic, Northern Ireland and Right-wing terrorism remains a serious threat.

Inverclyde has an embedded CTLO (Counter Terrorist Liaison Officer) who provides expert guidance and support regarding emerging threats from national and international terrorism & Extremism. Recent activities the CTLO has been involved with including work with Ports Authority in Inverclyde to assist with inspections and training to staff and Security officers to include vigilance about the threat from international terrorism, import & export due to Brexit and COVID-19 and the challenges brought by the increase with the Cruise ship industry.

CTLO in conjunction with National Counter Terrorism teams have been providing support, security advice and guidance to local MP / MSP after the tragic murder of Sir David Amess.

OFFICIAL

ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR, VOLENCE & DISORDER - DATA OVERVIEW

1 April 2021 to 31 October 2021 - OBJECTIVE: Reduce the number of victims of violent crime



CONTEXT

69 Group 1 crimes of violence have been recorded YTD – a decrease of 8.2% on the preceding five year average (n=75.2). One murder has been recorded and one attempted murder YTD. Meanwhile, robberies have fallen by 4.8% and serious assaults by 22.9% compared to the five year average. The detection rate for Group 1 crimes is 59.4%, compared to the five year average rate of 72.1%.

Common assaults are down by 4.8% on the five year average, to a total of 380. 94 crimes targeted emergency workers (most commonly police officers). The detection rate for common assaults fell from a five year average of 69.6% to 63.9% in the current year.

27 fire-raising crimes have been recorded, two fewer crimes than the previous five year average. The current detection rate is 11.1%, compared to the five year average rate of 14.2%. Meanwhile, recorded vandalism crimes fell from a five year average of 371 crimes to 263 crimes.

Antisocial Behaviour

CONTEXT

2,117 disorder incidents have been recorded year to date, a decrease of 23.9% on the previous two years' average. The spike noted in 2020/21 was primarily due members of the public reporting perceived or actual breaches of COVID-19 regulations.

Many disorder incidents reported in Inverclyde are as a result of groups of young people traveling along the rail network and specifically causing issues in Port Glasgow Town centre. The majority of young people who are gathering are



out socialising with friends of however a minority are intent on causing disorder. Several key partners are actively involved in a rolling weekly Disorder Action Plan including Police Scotland, BTP, Inverclyde Council Community Wardens and Youth Workers. When individuals are identified as being involved in disorder appropriate action is taken to engage, deter and prevent further disorder through a number of different avenues.

SERIOUS ORGANISED CRIME - DATA OVERVIEW

CONTEXT:

YTD, there have been 30 drug supply detections in Inverclyde, compared to a five year average of 43. Proactivity continues to target the two Serious and Organised Crime Groups (SOCGs) currently managed by Renfrewshire & Inverclyde Division, one of which predominantly impacts on Inverclyde. Both SOCGs are primarily involved in the supply of controlled drugs for financial gain, in addition to other harms such as the use and threat of violence and the use of firearms.



Enforcement activity is intelligence led to ensure the right people are being targeted in the right places. We continue to gather intelligence for

further enforcement action in Invercive and it remains a priority for officers to carry out intelligence led patrols ensuring that individuals involved in the possession and supply of controlled drugs are pro-actively engaged, subsequently leading to obtaining and executing search warrants.

PROTECTING PEOPLE AT RISK FROM HARM - DATA OVERVIEW

CONTEXT

Reported sexual crimes decreased by 15% compared to the preceding five year average, to a total of 77 crimes. The detection rate for sexual crimes is 23.4%, down from a five year average of 49.9%. 81% of sexual crimes reported in the current year occurred in dwell-ing houses and other private settings.

Invercive Police implemented a short life working group comprising of a small team of specially trained officers to investigate all live undetected sexual offences. After the review detection rates increased from 23.4% to 42.7%.

51% of the sexual crimes recorded in the reporting period were against young people under the age of 16 years at the time of the offence – with the number of child victims increasing by 77% on the previous year. However, the majority of these crimes involved non-recent reporting.



Reports recent sexual crimes have increased by 42%, while non-recent reports have fallen by 14% on the previous year. Nearly a third of reports in the current year involved non-recent reporting. 84% of non-recent sexual crimes involved victims aged under 16 years at the time the offence occurred. Ten non-recent crimes involving child victims occurred in child care institutions and are being investigated under the auspices of the Scottish Child Abuse Inquiry and Police Scotland's Operation FORSETI.

40 missing person reports have been recorded in Inverclyde, an increase of 27.5% compared to the previous year. There has been a reduction in the number of Young people (aged 10-19 years) from 14 to 11 as we implemented the Not At Home Protocol with the increase in reports being in the 20-59 year groups. Over 40% of all incidents resulted in missing persons being traced within 12 hours.

466 domestic abuse incidents have been recorded, down by 11.9% when compared to the previous five year average. 48.3% of these incidents resulted in at least one domestic crime being recorded. The detection rate for domestic crime was 67.2%, an increase 4.4 percentage points on the five year average detection rate.

Police in Invercive have been working with a number of local support services including DBI (Distress Brief intervention) to provide emotional support for people in crisis and VSS (Victim Support Scotland) for a number of support mechanisms utilising the victims fund to support victims of crime.

In a recent reported robbery incident Police were able to get swift engagement from VSS and Invercelyde Council to implement a number of support mechanisms including additional safety measures, food and replacement tablet computers for the victim and her children to help minimise the impact of the incident.

Road Traffic Data from 01/04/2021 to 31/10/2021



CONTEXT

There has been one road fatality throughout the reporting period. In the same period last year, there was also one road fatality. Meanwhile, four additional serious road injuries have been recorded (n=10) while there were five fewer slight road injuries (n=8). Three children have been seriously injured on Inverclyde's roads year-to-date, an increase on the same period last year.

While offences relating to motor vehicles fell by 27.3% on the five year average to a total of 676, notable increases were noted in respect of the number of disqualified, drink and drug and dangerous driving offences. 81 drink and drug driving offences (including failure to provide a sample) have been recorded—an increase of 46.7% on the previous five year average.

The detection rate for offences relating to motor vehicles overall fell by 7.2 percentage points on the five year average, to 85.1% in the current year, primarily due to the growing demand on Forensic Services resulting in delays in toxicology results being returned in relation to drink and drug driving offences. The detection rate for these drink and drug driving offences is 81.5%, down from a five year average of 93.1% (Awaiting toxicology lab results)

Local officers accompanied by Road Policing officers are conducting a series of engagement and enforcement initiatives aimed at raising awareness about various aspects of road safety and Drink / Drug driving leading upto the festive period. This has included a high visibility and unmarked patrols combined with speed checks at various locations with some drivers being issued fixed penalty notices, Anti-Social Behaviour orders or given appropriate road safety advice.

Enforcement activity was accompanied by a high profile media campaigns and a series of appeals aimed to raise awareness about the dangers of driving while intoxicated and asking the public to contact Police when a person is suspected of driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

CONTEXT

A total of 60 complaints have been made in the reporting period, equating to 30.8 complaints per 10,000 police incidents. No off duty allegations were made in the reporting period, while a total of 46 on duty allegations were made (compared to a three year average of 39 allegations). A total of 14 allegations were made in relation to quality of service, equal to the previous three year average.

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Local Fire and Rescue Service Plan Priorities

The Local Fire and Rescue Service Plan has been developed to set out the priorities and objectives within Inverceyde and allows our local authority partners to scrutinise the performance outcomes of these priorities. We will continue to work closely with our partners in Inverceyde to ensure we are all **"Working Together for a Safer Scotland**" through targeting risks to our communities at a local level.

The plan has been developed to complement key partnership activity embedded across Inverclyde Community Plan and associated Delivery and Thematic plans. Through partnership working we will seek to deliver continuous improvement in our performance and effective service delivery in our area of operations.

The Local Fire and Rescue Plan for Inverclyde identified six areas for demand reduction and is subject to regular monitoring and reporting through the Police / Fire and Rescue Committee. A summary of the priorities and current activity is detailed below with further detail and analysis contained within this performance report.

Where incidents are occuring the severity is predominately low and linked alarm systems and smoke detection are providing mitigation. SFRS will continue to support the transition to new detector legislation effective in February 2022.

ACENDA ITEM NO. 4

1.0 PURPOSE

1.1 The purpose of this report is to update the Local Police and Fire Scrutiny Committee on current and emerging issues relating to Police Scotland and Scottish Fire and Rescue Services and to outline a local proposal in respect of the development and delivery of the Inverclyde Community Safety Partnership Hub which follows on from the recent Elected Member Briefing.

2.0 SUMMARY

- 2.1 The report informs committee of local and national initiatives, reviews, and consultations and, where appropriate, informs Members of potential future agenda items relevant to Police Scotland and Scottish Fire and Rescue and local impacts.
- 2.2 This report is intended to draw these elements together with a view to informing and shaping future meeting agendas as appropriate and raising awareness of emerging issues.

3.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

- 3.1 That the Committee -
 - notes the current and emerging national issues relating to Police and Fire & Rescue matters; and
 - approves the formal development, governance and monitoring arrangements and roll out of the Inverclyde Community Safety Partnership Hub.

4.0 BODY WORN VIDEO

4.1 On Monday 4 October 2021, following extensive public engagement, Police Scotland's Armed Policing officers began operational deployments equipped with Body Worn Video (BWV). The use of BWV technology provides an additional level of transparency and accountability at incidents, ensures the gathering of best evidence, and will support the maintenance of public trust and confidence in policing. There have been a number of operational incidents where BWV has already been used, with footage being provided to support criminal investigations or referrals to the Police Investigations and Review Commissioner.

5.0 TASER ROLL OUT

- 5.1 Since 1 September 2021, 112 additional officers have been trained in Taser and deployed in possession of the device across Scotland. It is planned that a further 185 officers will be trained before the end of this financial year (31 March 2022), bringing the total number of deployable officers trained in Taser across the country to approximately 820. These officers will deploy from 87 response hubs across Scotland.
- 5.2 Between 1 April 2020 and 31 March 2021, officers in possession of Taser were deployed to 853 incidents. This resulted in 347 uses (116 draw 180 pointed and 51 discharges of the device). This included 13 uses (5 draw, 6 pointed and 2 discharges of the device) on persons under the age of 18.

Since 1 April 2021, officers in possession of Taser across Police Scotland have been deployed to 1,370 incidents. This has resulted in 238 uses (95 draw, 100 pointed and 43 discharges of the device). This includes 20 uses (5 draw, 13 pointed, 2 discharges of the device) on persons under the age of 18.

6.0 CYBER IMPLEMENTATION PLAN AND CYBER KIOSK

- 6.1 A Cyber Kiosk, also known as a 'Digital Triage Device', is a desktop computer with specific software installed that enables specially trained police officers to view data stored on a mobile phone or tablet. The introduction of Cyber Kiosks across Police Scotland was subject to significant scrutiny, and their roll out was completed in August 2020.
- 6.2 Cyber Kiosks provide Police Scotland with capability which allows the contents of a digital device associated with a police investigation or incident to be quickly assessed to establish if evidence is present. This allows lines of enquiry to be progressed at a much earlier stage, and potentially allows devices to be returned to owners where no material of evidential value is recovered.

7.0 INDEPENDENT ADVISORY GROUP ON EMERGING TECHNOLOGIES IN POLICING

- 7.1 The group was established following the work of the Justice Sub-Committee on Policing in exploring issues relating to the potential introduction of cyber kiosks, fiscal recognition, body-worn video cameras and remote piloted aircraft systems.
- 7.2 The work of the group is being progressed via four work streams, with each producing separate reports and recommendations:
 - Legal framework and ethical standards
 - Evidence and scientific standards
 - Consultation and community engagement
 - Oversight, scrutiny, and review

Elected Members will be advised of developments as and when the Independent Advisory Group publish the outcome of their research.

8.0 26TH CONFERENCE OF THE PARTIES (COP26)

- 8.1 COP26 was the most complex and challenging Policing operation ever experienced in the UK and involved the largest mobilisation of Mutual Aid officers travelling to Scotland. This was the first climate conference in 2 years, with over 25,000 delegates invited and approximately 13,000 persons attending each day. The 2 significant parades (Youth Rally and Climate Change Rally) were held over 2 days with over 10,000 police officers deployed over peak days each 24 hour period.
- 8.2 A considerable number of local Police Officers were part of the COP26 Policing operation and, whilst this had an impact on resources, Policing priorities in Inverclyde were maintained. This maintenance of these priorities was particularly relevant on and around the 5th November period where multi-agency resources and activities was co-ordinated by the agreed Community Safety Partnership Action Plan which saw the dedication of resources from Police Scotland and Scottish Fire & Rescue as well as Council Services including, but not limited to, Community Wardens and Youth Outreach Workers.

9.0 CALL HANDLING

The new variant of Covid presents significant challenges for police call answering times due to Staff absences and high demand. Police Scotland continues to communicate these challenges to the public. This issue is not limited to Police Scotland and represents a shared challenge for other emergency and public services. Police call handling has therefore seen an increase in demand. Police Scotland continue to prioritise 999 calls, maintains good 'immediate' 999 response times and continues working to mitigate anticipated lengthening wait times for 101 calls. The Scottish Police Authority continues to monitor and report on this situation.

10.0 SPA LOCAL AUTHORITY ENGAGEMENT PLAN

10.1 Dates for the SPAs local authority regional engagement plan have been confirmed, with the West Division meeting scheduled for Wednesday 16 March between 1.30pm – 4 pm. SPA Officials will be in contact to discuss arrangements and agenda items. Officers are available to support relevant Elected Members in the engagement plan.

11.0 THE SCOTTISH FIRE & RESCUE SERVICE BOARD

- 11.1 The meeting of SFRS Board was held on the <u>28th October 2021</u> and considered several updates, including:-
 - Change Committee
 - Audit & Risk Assurance Committee
 - People Committee
 - Service Delivery Committee

The following SFRS Board meeting took place on 16th December 2021, however reporting timescales did not allow for a full update to be included in this report.

12.0 5TH NOVEMBER ACTION PLAN - 2021

12.1 The Community Safety Partnership delivered the multi-agency 5th November Action Plan 2021 throughout October and early November. The plan included youth engagement, visits to approved traders, multi-agency attendance at known 'hot spots', facilities for the removal of bonfire materials and close communication between Police, Fire, Community Wardens and the Youth Outreach Workers on the evening of 5th November. The date passed largely without incident and upon review by all partners was deemed to be successful with a commitment to similar delivery in 2022, informed by relevant intelligence available at that time.

13.0 INVERCLYDE COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP HUB

- 13.1 On 2nd September 2021 Elected Members received a briefing from Area Commander Paul Cameron and Community Safety & Resilience Team Leader William Rice on the Inverclyde Community Partnership Hub which, at that time, had been piloted for a 4 month period. It was agreed to formalise the Hub as a fully operational model within the structure of the Community Safety Partnership, with a working model having been developed by Officers and considered and agreed by the Community Safety Partnership Strategic Group at its meeting of 11 January 2022.
- 13.2 The Partnership Hub operates on a tasking based model with a focus on community related issues; vulnerable people; drug & alcohol issues; anti-social behaviour; and violence. The Hub also offers a 'one-stop shop' model of contact for Elected Members, with a dedicated email address which is then filtered direct to relevant agencies for action and response.
- 13.3 The Partnership Hub is Police-led, in that it is hosted by the Police and relevant issues are initially identified from Police call logs. However, core partners such as SFRS, HSCP, the Council's Community Safety & Resilience Team and the Social Protection Team are represented at every meeting, will raise any relevant issues and act as conduit for relevant services within their respective Directorates. Housing Association colleagues and partners from (to be confirmed) are invited to meetings as and when relevant.
- 13.4 Appropriate information sharing agreements are in place with all partners and all attendees have committed to a confidentiality statement which is acknowledged at the start of each meeting. In terms of monitoring, data is securely held on a bespoke system and is analysed on by the Community Safety Partnership Data Analyst on a quarterly basis.
