
PRIORITY AREA	EXECUTIVE SUMMARY
Drug supply and misuse	Drug dealing and misuse continues to be a priority area for our attention in Inverclyde, with communities continuing to express concern about the harm caused by this issue. Year to date, 32 drug supply detections have been reported, a decrease of 21.6% on the previous five year average. However, we continue to gather intelligence for further enforcement action in Inverclyde.
Violence & ASB	Overall recorded violent crime has fallen by one percent on the previous five year average, to a total of 520 crimes. Common assaults have fallen by 0.7% on the previous five year average, while serious assaults have fallen even more considerably (-17%). Disorder incidents have fallen by 28.8% on the previous year, to a total of 1,509 incidents.
Dishonesty	Recorded crimes of dishonesty have fallen by 1.1% against the five year average, to a total of 877. Most categories of acquisitive crime have fallen, with the notable exceptions of shoplifting and fraud—both of which have increased substantially. In relation to shoplifting, exclusion zones for repeat shoplifters offending in Inverclyde have been introduced. We continue to roll out and expand a radio link system with businesses across Inverclyde.
Road Safety	In the period April to October 2022, the number of casualties on Inverclyde's roads rose from 24 to 31, with one road fatality occurring within that period. Proactive policing of Inverclyde's roads has led to an increase in detected drink and drug driving offences (+37.8% compared to the five year average). Inverclyde continues to receive additional patrols from Road Policing as and when required.



CONTEXT


The volume of recorded crime and offences has fallen by seven percent on the preceding five year average, primarily being driven by a drop in recorded offences relating to motor vehicles, miscellaneous offences, and sexual crimes. Meanwhile, recorded police incidents have fallen by 13.6% on the five year average, and remain 4.6% below 2021/22 figures. The decrease is partially due to a drop in police incidents relating to 'concern for person' and 'assist member of the public'.

ONLINE & CYBERCRIME - DATA OVERVIEW

→ CONTEXT

Analysis identified that in the period April – October 2022, 139 cyber-crimes were reported in Inverclyde, with the largest proportion being threatening/menacing telecommunications, closely followed by crimes of dishonesty (e.g. online fraud, including internet order fraud and phishing scams). Police Scotland continue to issue guidance to promote awareness of current scams taking place. Regular interaction takes place within local schools to make children aware of the dangers of Social Media. In September 2022 Community Officers delivered an online Safety briefing at Port Glasgow Town Hall to Morton Football Club Youth Academy players and their family.

ACQUISITIVE CRIME — DATA OVERVIEW



CONTEXT



340 shoplifting crimes have been recorded – an increase of 15.1% compared to the five year average. The detection rate has increased from a five year average of 79.8% to 83.2% in the current year. Exclusion zones have been introduced in Inverclyde which would assist with managing repeat offenders. We are also continuing to roll out radio link system for businesses across Inverclyde to enhance communications.



Housebreaking crimes (including attempts) fell from a five year average of approximately 116 crimes, to 97 crimes in the current year (-16.5%). Housebreaking crimes which involves dwelling houses and non-dwellings have fallen on respective five year averages, however housebreaking involving other premises (such as sheds, outbuildings) have increased by 13.3%. The detection rate decreased from five year average rate of 20.8%, to 19.6%.



Acquisitive crimes targeting motor vehicles have fallen by 37.1% on the five year average to a total of 67 crimes. Thefts of motor vehicles continue to account for the highest proportion of motor vehicle crime (n=34). The motor vehicle acquisitive crime detection rate is 35.8%, an increase of six percentage points on the previous five year average.



Three bogus caller crimes have been recorded in the current year, all three crimes involved suspects accepting payment for services which they failed to complete or undertake.

COUNTER TERRORISM & DOMESTIC EXTREMISM


CONTEXT


In February 2022 the Home Secretary announced a decrease in the UK's Terrorist Threat Level from 'Severe' to 'Substantial'. This means it is deemed an attack is likely. At this time there is nothing to suggest that there is any specific threat to Scotland. However, the threat from Islamic, Northern Ireland and Right-wing terrorism remains a serious threat.

Renfrewshire and Inverclyde Division has an embedded CTLO (Counter Terrorist Liaison Officer) who provides expert guidance and support regarding emerging threats from national and international terrorism & Extremism. The CTLO has carried out a Counter Terrorism Awareness input with students at West College Scotland at the Greenock Campus who are currently enrolled in the Sociology and Criminal Justice Course.

ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR, VOLENCE & DISORDER - DATA OVERVIEW

1 April 2022 to 30 November 2022 - OBJECTIVE: Reduce the number of victims of violent crime





CONTEXT

95 Group 1 non-sexual crimes of violence have been recorded YTD – an increase of 5.3% on the preceding five year average (n=90.2). The number of murders have fallen on previous five year average figures, however attempted murders have increased by 20%. Meanwhile, the number of reported serious assaults have fallen by 17%. Robberies and crimes of assault with intent to rob have increased from a five year average of 16 crimes to 23 in the current year. Robbery crimes of this type have fluctuated during the reporting period and have begun to decline in number in the recent months.


Meanwhile, common assaults have fallen by 0.7% on the five year average, to a total of 448 crimes. 78 of these crimes targeted emergency workers (most commonly police officers) - a reduction of 22.6% on the five year average.

55 wilful fireraising crimes have been recorded— an increase of 65.7% on the previous five year average (n=33.2). The current detection rate is 29.1%, compared to the five year average rate of 12%. Meanwhile, recorded vandalism crimes fell by 1.3% on the five year average, to a total of 367 crimes in the reporting period.

Disorder and Antisocial Behaviour

CONTEXT

1,509 complaints regarding disorder have been recorded year to date, a decrease of 32.5% on the previous four year average. While the multi-member ward of Inverclyde North continues to account for the highest volume of recorded disorder within the local authority area (with over 29% of reported disorder occurring in this ward), it has also experienced a decrease of 10.3% in reported disorder compared to the previous year.



Youth disorder in the Inverdyde area continues to reduce with the

number of large scale gatherings decreasing however we are still receiving reports of youths causing disorder near to retailers who have longer opening hours.

Police continue to target areas where instances of disorder are taking place as part of the weekly disorder action plan which involves key partners including BTP, Inverclyde Council Community Wardens and Youth Workers. When persons are identified as being involved in disorder, appropriate action is taken against them.

SERIOUS ORGANISED CRIME - DATA OVERVIEW


CONTEXT:

YTD, there have been 32 drug supply detections in Inverclyde, compared to a five year average of approximately 40.8 detections, a decrease of 21.6%.

Proactivity continues to target the Serious and Organised Crime Groups currently operating in Inverclyde, one of which predominantly impacts on Inverclyde. The organised criminality of the Inverclyde-based group predominantly involves drug supply activities. Enforcement activity is intelligence led to ensure the right people are being targeted in the right places.

We continue gathering further intelligence to target individuals involved in the sale and supply of controlled drugs. This has resulted

in numerous search warrants being executed, a surveillance operation, multiple individuals charged with being concerned in the supply of drugs and a high value of drugs and monies seized.



PROTECTING PEOPLE AT RISK FROM HARM - DATA OVERVIEW

CONTEXT

Sexual Crime

Reported sexual crimes have fallen by 13.6% on the preceding five year average, to a total of 90 crimes. The detection rate for sexual crimes is 48.9%, an increase of 2.6 percentage points on the five year average rate. The crime of Rape of a Female (16+) has fallen significantly by 55.2% on the same period PYTD, along with Sexual Assault of a Male (<13) which has fallen by 100%. These decreases have contributed to the overall drop in sexual crimes.



Missing People

Between April and October 2022, 121 missing person reports have been recorded in Inverclyde, as compared to 40 in the same period in the previous year. Almost a third of the total number missing person incidents related to the top five most frequent repeat missing people within Inverclyde., most of whom were aged 16 years and younger. Overall, over 57% of missing people in Inverclyde were aged 19 or under—with missing persons incidents involving younger people increasing by nearly six times on the previous year. Almost 77% of missing persons were traced within 24 hours, with 95% being traced within four days.

Domestic Abuse


512 domestic abuse incidents have been recorded, a reduction of 0.9% when compared to the previous five year average. 43.9% of these incidents resulted in at least one domestic crime being recorded. The detection rate for domestic crime was 85.7%, an increase from the average five year rate of 64.4%.

CONTEXT

One fatality occurred on Inverclyde's roads in the reporting period of April—October 2022. Meanwhile, eleven people were seriously injured (an increase of one on the previous year) and seventeen people incurred slight injuries (seven more than the previous year). It is highly likely that a continued shift back towards pre-pandemic traffic levels is a contributory factor to this rise. No children have been killed, however two have been seriously injured on Inverclyde's roads in the current reporting year.

Offences relating to motor vehicles have fallen by 28.4% on the previous five year average, to a total of 653. The detection rate for offences relating to motor vehicles is 85.3%, a slight decrease on the previous five year average (88.6%).

Drink and drug driving offences have increased by almost 38% compared to the five year average, which is as a result of local officers and Road Policing officers carrying out proactive checks on motorists while on high visibility patrols. Speed checks continue to be carried out at various locations with relevant action being taken.

Inverciyde Police carried out Operation Close Pass which involved local Community Officers and colleagues in Road Policing targeting drivers who failed to provide enough safe distance to cyclists using the areas roadways.

Local Fire and Rescue Service Plan Priorities

The Local Fire and Rescue Service Plan has been developed to set out the priorities and objectives within Inverciyde and allows our local authority partners to scrutinise the performance outcomes of these priorities. We will continue to work closely with our partners in Inverciyde to ensure we are all "Working Together for a Safer Scotland" through targeting risks to our communities at a local level.

The plan has been developed to complement key partnership activity embedded across Inverciyde Community Plan and associated Delivery and Thematic plans. Through partnership working we will seek to deliver continuous improvement in our performance and effective service delivery in our area of operations.

The Local Fire and Rescue Plan for Inverciyde identified six areas for demand reduction and is subject to regular monitoring and reporting through the Police / Fire and Rescue Committee. A summary of the priorities and current activity is detailed below with further detail and analysis contained within this performance report.




Activity by Time of Day




Incidents by Classification




Top 15 Incidents Types by %







Domestic Safety - Accidental Dwelling Fires


















Accidental Dwelling Fires show a slight increase of 2 incidents from Q3 2021/22 and a 5% reduction against the 3 year average. Cooking remains the most common source of ignition within Inverclyde accounting for 11 of the Accidental Dwelling Fires. It is pleasing that 12 of the incidents required no firefighting action and only 7 required removal from the heat source. It is pleasing that in 74% of incidents there was detection present with raising the alarm in 64% of incidents, this emphasises the importance of having working smoke and heat detection within the home.

Domestic Safety - Accidental Dwelling Fire Casualties



We have had an increase of 1 Fire Casualty from the same reporting period last year which is disappointing with the main cause being cooking. The casualty suffered slight smoke inhalation and attended hospital as a precaution only. It is worth noting that the premises had working detection and raised the Alarm. It is positive to note that we continue to see significant reductions against the 3 year average of 45%.







I am pleased to report a reduction of 11% in special service incidents over this reporting period and a 15% reduction against a low 3 year average. It is also worth noting that 45% of these incidents were to assist other agencies to gain access to a domestic property. Its is pleasing that we have had no water related incidents. 45% of incidents were Road Traffic Collisions 4 were minor collisions and 1 resulted in a hospital admission with serious injury.

Non-Fire Emergency Activity








<u>Primary Fires</u> - all fires in buildings, vehicles and outdoor structures or any fire involving casualties, rescues or fires attended by five or more appliances

<u>Secondary Fires</u> – fire incidents that did not occur at a primary location, was not a chimney fire in an occupied building, did not involve casualties (otherwise categorised as a primary incident) and was attended by four or fewer appliances.


Deliberate Fires by Time of Day




Deliberate Fires by Classification



Primary Fire Ratio by Activity Type




Deliberate Fires Compared to Operational Activity




It is pleasing to report a significant reduction of 48% in deliberate fire setting against the year on year indicator and 17% reduction against the 3 year average. It is concerning that the 12 primary incidents involved 6 vehicles and 6 domestic dwellings with the remaining secondary incidents mostly involving refuse containers and grassland.


Non Domestic Fire Safety














We have a increase of 300% in non domestic incidents during the period, this equates to an additional 3 incidents against the same reporting period last year, it is worthy noting that that we see a 20% reduction across the three year average which is also against historical low figures across Inverclyde. It is pleasing that there was no fire damage within 50% of incidents and with only 50% having heat and smoke damage only. It is worthy of note that 2 incidents required no Firefighting action with 1 being a removal from the heat source and only 2 requiring direct firefighting.

Unwanted Fire Alarm Signals
















We have a slight 2% increase in UFAS incidents during the reporting period and we also see a slight 2% increase across the 3 year average with educational and care facilities accounting for the majority of UFAS incidents. It is disappointing that the majority of these incidents were avoidable as we continue to experience the trend where activations were due to human influence. It is worth noting that we have seen a reduction within hospital and commercial premises that can be attributed by direct education from operational crews and our UFAS champion.

3.0 THE SCOTTISH POLICE AUTHORITY BOARD

3.1 The meeting of SPA Board was held on the 24 Nov 2022

- Children in custody
- Regional engagement meetings

3.2 <u>Parliamentary evidence – pre-budget scrutiny</u>

On Thursday 26 October 2022, Deputy Chief Officer David Page and Chief Financial Officer James Gray, along with SPA Chief Executive Lynn Brown, provided evidence to the Scottish Parliament's Criminal Justice Committee as part of their pre-budget scrutiny. In written submission and during oral evidence, it was reiterated the significant implications for policing in Scotland, should the flat cash settlement approach from the Scottish Government's Resource Spending Review translate into a budget settlement for 2023-24 and beyond.

3.3 Children in custody

On 15 November 2022, the Authority and Police Scotland hosted a roundtable session with a range of key partners to discuss how they can work together to reduce the number of children held in police custody. There was overwhelming agreement that holding a child or young person in police custody was inappropriate. Throughout the day, delegates focused on the overarching objective of identifying how, by working in partnership, children could be taken to alternative and more appropriate places of safety while still allowing police officers and partner organisations to undertake their duties.

3.4 Regional engagement meetings

As part of the 'Local Government Engagement Plan 2021-23' the Authority and Police Scotland hosted the latest round of regional meetings with scrutiny conveners and officials representing the North, West and East of the country. The recent meetings provided a good introduction for many newly elected councillors. There was an operational focus to the discussions which was supported by the ACC and divisional presence.

3.5 Mental health in policing

The Authority co-hosted with Police Scotland a conference looking at mental health demand on policing on Friday 9 December 2022 in Edinburgh. The event sought to bring partners together to discuss the challenges faced by policing and by those experiencing mental health.

3.6 Drug driving update

Members were assured that the internal backlog in relation to drug driving was reducing with the new outsourcing contract being implemented and additional cases now being outsourced. The committee sought assurance around the real-time information in relation to the number of cases being time barred and were assured that it is an improving picture with zero cases for September 2022.

4.0 CRIMINAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE

- 4.1 The 14 December 2022 committee took evidence on the Bail and Release from Custody (Scotland) Bill at Stage 1. The Bill makes changes to the law in two main areas:
 - · decisions about granting bail to people accused of a crime
 - arrangements for the release of some prisoners and the support that is provided to those who leave prison.

5.0 SCOTTISH POLICE AUTHORITY CORPORATE STRATEGY 2023-26 INITIAL CONSULTATION

5.1 The SPA has conducted a review exercise to inform proposed outcomes and activities for the Corporate Strategy for the period 2023-26. This included a review of existing outcomes, and delivery against these, a strategic horizon scanning exercise, and a light touch benchmarking exercise against similar oversight organisations. The Authority are initially seeking open-ended responses to test the conclusions, with a view to consulting more widely and in a more structured way when there is a final draft of the strategy. Council officers will prepare a written response by the deadline of Monday 16 January 2023.

6.0 LOCAL POLICE PLANS 2023 - 2026 CONSULTATION

- 6.1 Section 47 of Police and Fire Reform (Scotland) Act 2012 states that a local commander must prepare a local police plan. The planning cycle for the development of the Local Police Plans 2023-26 has commenced. Priorities have been established through the Your Police survey mechanism, which has allowed members of the public and private and third sector organisations to tell local divisions what is important to them, and what they want officers and staff to prioritise during the lifespan of the Local Police Plan.
- 6.2 The draft Inverclyde Local Policing Plan has identified the following priorities:
 - Violence, disorder and Anti-Social Behaviour
 - Protecting Vulnerable People
 - · Acquisitive, Cyber and Digital Crime
 - Serious and Organised Crime
 - Road Safety and Road Crime

The plan outlines key activities, milestones, and performance measures for achieving objectives.

6.3 The legislation also requires the local commander to consult on the local police plan with such other persons as they consider appropriate and subsequently an invitation was made to Inverclyde Council, as a community partner, to respond to the consultation.

Council Officers will prepare a response in consultation with the Local Police and Fire Scrutiny Panel. As the consultation closes on 12 Feb 2023 the response will be reported to this panel at the meeting following this date.

7.0 LOCAL POLICE PLANS - A FRAMEWORK FOR SCRUTINY

7.1 During 2022 the Scottish Police Authority and COSLA worked in partnership with local government representatives to develop new guidance for Elected Members to support their scrutiny of local police planning. The framework for scrutiny was endorsed in December at the COSLA Police Scrutiny Conveners' Forum, which represents scrutiny arrangements for all 32 Local Authority areas.

7.2 Council Officers will report on the new guidance at the next meeting of this panel.

8.0 THE SCOTTISH FIRE & RESCUE SERVICE BOARD

- 8.1 The SFRS held a board meeting on the 15 Dec 2022 https://www.firescotland.gov.uk/about-us/sfrs-board/board-meetings, which considered general business matters, including:
 - Action and decision logs
 - Chair's and Chief Officer's report
 - Committee reports
 - Budget reports
 - Draft Corporate Parenting Plan and Action Plan 2023-26
 - Health and Safety Annual Report 2021-22
 - Budget Strategy 2023-24 (private session)

The minutes from this meeting were not yet published at the time of this report.

8.2 As a Corporate Parent, SFRS must prepare, publish and review a 'Corporate Parenting Plan', which details how they will exercise their Corporate Parenting responsibilities and Under Part 9 of Children and Young People (Scotland) Act 2014. SFRS have prepared a draft Corporate Parenting Plan 2023-2026 for publication in January 2023. The plan was presented for noting to the SFRS board on 15 December 2022.

The six outcomes are:

- SFRS will have built relationships with organisations representing those who are care
 experienced. We will have listened to the voice of people who are Care Experienced and
 considered their needs in our policy, planning and performance' activities.
- SFRS services and opportunities are known and accessible to all care experienced individuals, including care leavers, with no barriers.
- We have consulted with SFRS employees who are Care Experienced and identified what can be done to build better formal and informal support mechanisms within the organisation.
- We have worked in partnership with other Corporate Parents and external organisations to improve opportunities for those who are Care Experienced to develop skills, experience and confidence to achieve their personal, employment and career ambitions.
- SFRS colleagues, volunteers and board members are aware of their role as a Corporate Parent and understand how to be a good Corporate Parent in practice.
- We will have developed measures to track our progress and determine if our outcomes are successful.

9.0 FIRE & RESCUE INCIDENT STATISTICS 2021-22

9.1 SFRS published their 2021-22 incident statistics on 31 October 2022. Inverclyde remained the local authority with the highest rate for total fires at 904 per 100,000 population and for secondary fires at 700 per 100,000 population. The rate of primary fires per 100,000 population decreased from 215 in 2020-21 to 198 in 2021-22, resulting in a move from fifth highest authority to seventh.

10.0 FBU STRIKE BALLOT

10.1 Firefighters and control staff are being balloted on potential strike action. The ballot opened on 5 December 2022 and closes on 30 January 2023.

11.0 SCOTTISH BUDGET 2023-24

- 11.1 On 19 December the Scottish Government published a statement on the 2023-24 budget "Recognising the crucial role Police Scotland officers and staff play keeping our communities safe, the service will receive substantial additional resource funding of £80 million in the next financial year, a 6.3% increase. Police capital funding has been maintained at £45.5 million for investment in assets including the estate, fleet, and technology. This brings the policing budget to £1.45 billion for 2023-24. The Scottish Fire and Rescue Service will receive a £10 million increase to support service delivery".
- 11.2 Chief constable Sir Iain Livingstone responded to the budget, saying "Hard choices lie ahead to deliver effective policing within the revenue budget available and our capital funding remains significantly lower than that needed to progress improvement to our technology, buildings and vehicles.
 - "However, the budget for 2023/24 is an improvement on the level indicated in the Scottish Government's resource spending review and a welcome recognition of the significant transformation, saving and enhanced service delivered by Police Scotland"
- 11.3 The Chair of the Scottish Police Authority, Martyn Evans, has responded to the Scottish Government's 2023/24 budget statement, saying:
 - "When the Scottish Government published its Resource Spending Review in May, setting out a flat cash revenue budget position for policing, we were clear that the implications would be extremely serious and we have worked hard to make the case for policing and forensic services.

"There are clearly very considerable constraints on public spending and policing is not immune to those. Today's budget announcement represents an improved position from May's Resource Spending Review and we acknowledge that support.

"Over the years, the Authority has consistently highlighted the need for significant investment to maintain, transform and improve policing. Today's settlement is welcome, but it does not meet this ongoing requirement. Difficult choices remain to ensure a balanced budget position next year. We are already working closely with the Chief Constable and the Director of Forensic Services to consider what will need to be prioritised for the year ahead."
