Subject: Application for the Renewal of a Late Hours Catering Licence

Mr. Lau Fong Chan

Premises – The Lucky House, 83-84 Shore Street, Gourock

1.0 PURPOSE

1.1 The purpose of this report is to ask the Board to consider the renewal application for a late hours catering licence for premises known as The Lucky House, 83-84 Shore Street, Gourock.

2.0 SUMMARY

2.1 An application for the renewal of a late hours catering licence has been made by Mr. Lau Fong Chan for the premises known as The Lucky House, 83-84 Shore Street, Gourock. The hours of the existing licence are noted below.

Sundays to Thursdays	11pm to 12.30am
Fridays & Saturdays	11pm to 1am

- 2.2 The Board may wish to note the hours that form Inverclyde Council's Policy for Late Hours Catering are Sundays to Thursdays 11pm to 12.30am and Fridays and Saturdays 11pm to 1.30am
- 2.3 In terms of the Civic Government (S) Act 1982 this application requires to be decided upon within six months of the date of the application. Therefore a decision requires to be made no later than 22 February 2016.
- 2.4 Six public objections have been received and copies of these form Appendix 1 to this report.
- 2.5 The applicant has been given an opportunity in terms of the Act to make representations in writing to the objections but as yet no letter of response has been received.
- 2.6 In terms of Section 42 of the Civic Government (Scotland) Act 1982 a late hours catering licence is required for the use of premises between the hours of 11pm and 5am for the sale to or consumption by the public of food. In terms of the Council's Resolution using premises for late hours catering is an activity which the Council Licence.

3.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

- 3.1 The Board are asked to decide whether or not they wish to hear the applicant in support of his application.
- 3.2 The Board are asked to consider the matter in the light of the foregoing and to determine whether or not the application may be granted.

4.0 BACKGROUND

- 4.1 An application for the renewal of a late hours catering licence has been made by Mr. Lau Fong Chan premises known as The Lucky House, 83-84 Kempock Street, Gourock to allow for the operation of a late hours catering facility between the hours of 11.00pm and 12 Midnight Sundays to Thursdays and 11.00pm and 1.00am Fridays and Saturdays.
- 4.2 Inverclyde Council records show that Mr. Chan has held a Late hours Catering Licence since August 1994. The Council has not received any untoward reports about the operation of the premises

- The Board will note that the provisions in the act regarding the refusal of an application stipulate that a Licensing Authority shall refuse an application, where, in their opinion certain grounds apply including:-
 - (a) the applicant or, where the applicant is not a natural person, any director of it or partner in it or any other person responsible for its management is either
 - (i) for the time being disqualified under section 7(6) of this Act, or
 - (ii) not a fit and proper person to be the holder of the licence;
 - (b) Where a licence applied for relates to an activity consisting of or including the use of premises or a vehicle or vessel, those premises are not, or as the case may be, that vehicle or vessel is not suitable or convenient for the conduct of the activity having regard to;
 - (i) the location, character or condition of the premises or the character or condition of the premises or the character or condition of the vehicle or vessel;
 - (ii) the nature and extent of the proposed activity;
 - (iii) the kind of persons likely to be in the premises, vehicle or vessel;
 - (iv) the possibility of undue public nuisance; or
 - (v) public order or public safety; or
 - (c) there is other good reason for refusing the application.
- 5.3 Mr. Chan has recourse to the Sheriff Court in the event he wishes to appeal any decision of the Board.
