## 1.0 PURPOSE

1.1 The purpose of this report is to update the Integration Joint Board on a number of workstreams that are currently underway.

### 2.0 SUMMARY

2.1 As we move forward, there are a number of issues or business items or workstreams that the IJB will want to be aware of, that perhaps do not require a full IJB Report. ### 4.0 BACKGROUND

4.1 This report highlights workstreams that IJB Members should be alert to.

### 4.2 Criminal Justice

Criminal Justice Authorities will be formally disestablished on the 31st March. In December of 2016 Local Authorities were advised of the funding arrangements for criminal justice social work under a revised funding formula. For Inverclyde this represents a reduction in funding of 25% over five years. Offices are currently assessing the impact of this.

# 4.3 Corporate Parenting Strategy

A Corporate Parenting Strategy has been developed with the HSCP being the lead agency in this development. The strategy aligns with the Children's Services Plan that is in the final stages of development. A Looked After Children's Champions board will be established and will be supported by the recent award of Big Lottery Funding.

## 4.4 <u>Joint Inspection of Children's Services</u>

It is anticipated that Inverclyde will receive imminent notification of the Strategic Inspection of Children's Services. This inspection focuses on provision of services to children and family by the full range of Community Planning Partners. The inspection will be particularly concerned to understand the impact of services for the most vulnerable children in the area. The inspection foot print is 35 weeks and requires a high level of officer support. A joint All Member and JJB briefing is being planned to prepare members and non-executive members for their new role in inspection.
